## F4U-1 BIRDCAGE CORSAIRS

Early Birdcage Corsairs were determined to be unsuitable for carrier operations in the Pacific. However, the Marines gladly pressed this high performance fighter into service as part of their island hopping campaign. As their aircraft were all land based, carrier arresting gear was removed. To accurately represent the first two schemes with this decal sheet, the modeler may wish to incorporate that important detail to their kit.

Photos also indicate limited stenciling applied to the aircraft with only the BuNo and aircraft type applied in small black text on the vertical surfaces. Stenciling has been provided for the propeller blades.

The aircraft displayed two different styles of "7" on the forward gear doors. These doors also painted Dark Blue, not matching the lowersurface colors in that immediate area. To conform to new orders displaying the national insignia, non-standard White bars added to the existing markings in six positions.

Pilot: Maj Robert G Owens Jr. Co of the unit, Owens credited with 7 victories. Photos don't reveal the artwork for the left side, therefore a provisional decal has been provided. Owens only flew this aircraft once, though he did approve the name and is associated with it.

The scheme applied is provisional in nature as reference photos are badly highlighted. It does appear to have a field-applied three tone pattern with Dark Blue on the upper fuselage, Intermediate Blue on the fuselage sides and upper wings and Light Gray or White under the fuselage and non folding portion of the wings.

Pilot: Lt(jg) James Halford. VF-17 took the Corsair aboard the U.S.S. Bunker Hill during their qualification cruise. The four victory markings added to the fuselage represent the victories claimed while flying the F4F Wildcat at Guadalcanal. He claimed no victories in the Corsair.

A relatively freshly painted Corsair, this aircraft was finished in the new three-tone scheme. National insignia in four positions.

Fuselage Sides: Intermediate Blue FS35164

Bottom: White Prop Hub: Black
