P-51D-15(or 20)-NA, 44-72558, flown by Lts. Bennett Commer and Henry Seegers, 458 FS/506 FG., Airfield No. 3, Iwo Jima, summer 1945. The Boll Weevil had 12 mission markers under the windshield and 6 more in front of the Tactical number. A Japanese kill marking, the name A Neat Package and a beautiful pinup decorated the right side of this colorful a/c. Notice the Black aiming stripes on top of the wing's leading edges and the insignia Blue or Navy Sea Blue empennage (not the control surfaces).

P-51D-20-NA, 44-72587, flown by James Bercaw and William Ebersole (rank unknown), Airfield No. 3, Iwo Jima, summer of 1945. HON MISTAKE probably had the most elaborated and funny nose art of the whole group throughout the whole war. One ground victory marker, seven blank White rectangles over eight escort markers and one Black blank over two sweeps markers with two blanks decorated this a/c left side. Ground crew names, B. Hyman and S. Ginsberg showed under the canopy. A colorful Yellow tail added more color to this beautifully marked aircraft.

P-51D-20-NA 44-63483 flown by Major Robert W. "Todd" Moore, 45th Fighter Squadron, 15th Fighter Group, based at South Field, Iwo Jima, during the summer of 1945. This later version of the 45th Squadron markings consisted of Apple Green spinners and the same color bands on all wing and tail surface tips on a Natural Metal finish. Olive Drab antiglare panel forward of the cockpit. Stinger VII was marked on both sides of the nose and twelve victory markings

were carried under the cockpit on the left side only. Note the Black twin VHF antennas forward of the dorsal fin. Iwo-based Mustangs carried the large 165 gallon fuel tanks on their long range escort missions.


P-51D-20-NA 44-72579 flown by Captain J.B. Baker, 458th Fighter Squadron, 506th Fighter Group, which arrived at North Field, Iwo Jima in April of 1945. The 506th used different tail colors for each of their squadrons, the 458th having Insignia Blue diagonal stripes on the vertical and horizontal tails of their Natural Metal finished Mustangs. Delta Queen had a Bunny Rabbit on the left side and an attractive archer on the right side. Six mission marks were carried indicating one aerial victory, two enemy aircraft destroyed on the ground and three long range escort missions. In

addition, this a/c sports a Luftwaffe-style spiral on its spinner. Twin VHF

antenna masts carried. Use extra rabbit ears (Decal #43) when building aircraft with canopy open. The name Delta Queen looks to us Red with Black outline. However,

it may well be Yellow/Black, your choice.

provide fighter cover for B-29s bombing Tokyo and other Japanese cities, the VLR P-51s enjoyed such success that they soon were called to make low-level attacks against ground targets as well. In the course of those missions, which averaged more than eight hours duration, the VLR pilots scored 234.5 confirmed aerial victories, plus another 219 Japanese aircraft destroyed on the ground.

Carl Molesworth's latest book "Very Long Range P-51 units of the Pacific war", is scheduled for publication by Osprey Publishing in September 2006. This book is recommended as further reading on this interesting, somewhat obscure, but highly important operation to

the results of this conflict.
