






F4F-3, BuNo 4031, VF-3. Upper surfaces Blue Gray; lower surfaces Light Gray. Prop hub natural metal. Flown by LT Edward H. "Butch" O'Hare on his Medal of Honor mission of 20 February 1942 near Rabaul. USS Lexington (CV2).







