"White 17" Fw 190 D-9 W. Nr. unknown

1/JG 2

May 1945

Minus the engine power egg "White 17" provides a fine example of the late three-piece gun cowl with round bulge on rear in the low position (No. 2). Constructed by Focke-Wulf in the 210 or 211 series Werknummer block. Early style canopy type 8-190.122. No antenna pulley system (provisional); all antennas intact; metal flaps.

Colors: Undersurfaces: RLM 76 Light Blue; upper landing gear door dark, RLM 75? Uppersurfaces; RLM 75 Gray-Violet/RLM 83 Dark Green; dark camouflage area on lower rear fuselage behind cross. No Black exhaust panel. Prop blades & Spinner; RLM 70 Black-

Green, spinner not in photo. Fuselage I.D. Bands: Yellow/White/Yellow, 300 mm each

National Markings: Fuselage: B4 800 mm Black outline crosses. H3 420 mm Black Hakenkreuz not in photo

Wings: Upper: B6 910 mm White outline crosses Lower: B4 900 mm Black outline crosses

Stenciling: Factory standard

"Yellow 9" Fw 190 D-9

W. Nr. 210023(?) 3/JG 2

May 1945

A very early Focke-Wulf Sorau produced D-9 with the H2a Black and White Hakenkreuz; however, may have been upgraded as indicated by a blown canopy and mismatched radiator cowling. The Änderungsstufe data plate verifies some modification completed. These very early Sorau machines were originally issued to III./JG 54. After modifications this aircraft may have been reissued to JG 2. Blown canopy type 8-190.1025; antennas not visible; early five-piece gun cowl with small round bulge on rear in high position (No. 1). The additional Änderungsstufe data plate is attached.

Colors: Typical early Sorau camouflage. Undersurfaces: RLM 76 Light Blue. Uppersurfaces: RLM 75 Gray-Violet/RLM 83 Dark Green; radiator cowling mismatched. No Black exhaust panel. Prop blades & Spinner; RLM 70 Black-Green, spinner Black with White spiral. Fuselage I.D. Bands; Yellow/White/Yellow, 300 mm each; previous tactical number overpainted.

National Markings: Fuselage: B4 800 mm Black outline crosses. H2a Black with White outline Hakenkreuz.

Wings: Upper: B6 910 mm White outline crosses

Lower: B4 900 mm Black outline crosses (provisional)

Stenciling: Factory standard with glycol stencil on upper forward engine cowling as seen on most III./JG 54 D-9s. 

"White 7" Fw 190 D-9

IV/JG 51

2 May 1945

Flensburg, Germany

One of the IV./JG 51 aircraft surrendered 1 and 2 May 1945 to RAF troops at Flensburg, a 600 series Fieseler-built machine. Blown canopy type 8-190.1025; all antennas intact; ETC 504 rack; late three-piece gun cowl with no bulges or flairs (No. 5); Anderungsstufe data plate. Colors: Could be camouflaged as early 600 series in 76/75/74 such as W. Nr. 600150 "< 1" JG 4. Undersurfaces: RLM 76 Light Blue, Yellow

undercowling. Uppersurfaces: RLM 75 Gray-Violet/RLM 74 Gray-Green or RLM 76/RLM 75/RLM 83 Dark Green, or possibly RLM 76/RLM 82 Bright Green/RLM 83; profile depicts RLM 76/RLM 75/RLM 83; upper wings probably RLM 74/RLM75; rudder is a light color. No Black exhaust panel. Prop blades & Spinner: RLM 70 Black-Green.

National Markings: Fuselage: B5 600 mm White outline crosses filled with dark camo. H3 530 mm Black Hakenkreuz.

Wings: Upper: B6 910 mm White outline crosses

Lower: B1b 900 mm Black Crosses

Stenciling: Not visible; glycol stencil on forward gun cowl.

Stab JG 2

1946 Rhein-Main (Frankfurt), Germany This well-known Dora 9 marked with Geschwader Major beim Stab chevrons has been a subject of controversy over the true color of the fuselage identification bands. In a series of photos taken by Richard Beuschel in 1946, the fuselage bands appear dark as a result of using orthochromatic film. Since Black/White/Black bands are the colors of JG 4, it is natural to assume this Dora 9 had been assigned to that unit; however, with that in mind the bands still are not as dark when compared to the Stab markings and the Hakenkreuz which are Black. The contrast is much more evident in later photos taken with other types of film contributing to the conclusion that the bands are Yellow/White/Yellow. Additionally elements of JG 2 were stationed at nearby Zellhausen and Babenhausen with many flights originating from Rhein-Main as recorded by the flight log from the airfield. Blown canopy type 8-190.1025; all antennas intact, FuG 16 zy not visible; late three-piece gun cowl with no bulges or flairs (No.5); round repair patches on port side under windscreen; Anderungsstufe data plate attached. Colors: Undersurfaces: RLM 76 Light Blue; does not appear to have a Yellow undercowling. Uppersurfaces: RLM 75 Gray-Violet/RLM 83

Dark Green (illustrated) or RLM 74 Gray-Green as W. Nr. 600150 JG 4; engine cowling has Gray streaks; upperwings RLM 75/RLM 74 (provisional). No Black exhaust panel. Prop blades & Spinner: RLM 70 Black-Green, spinner Black with White spiral. Fuselage I.D. Bands: Yellow/White/Yellow, 300 mm each

National Markings: Fuselage: B5 600 mm White outline crosses filled with dark camo. H3 530 mm Black Hakenkreuz.

Wings: Upper: B6 910 mm White outline crosses Lower: B1b 900 mm Black crosses

Stenciling: Factory standard; no Achtung! canopy ejection warning label on pilot's headrest; Red towing data visible on lower starboard fin
