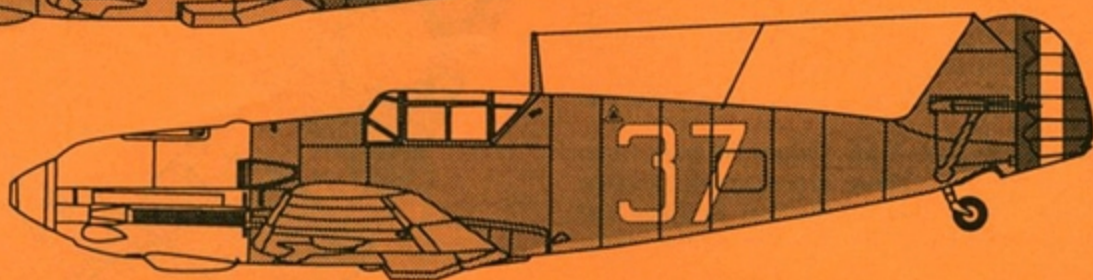

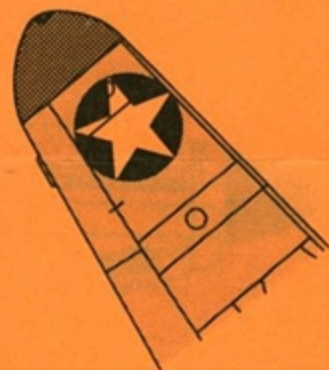
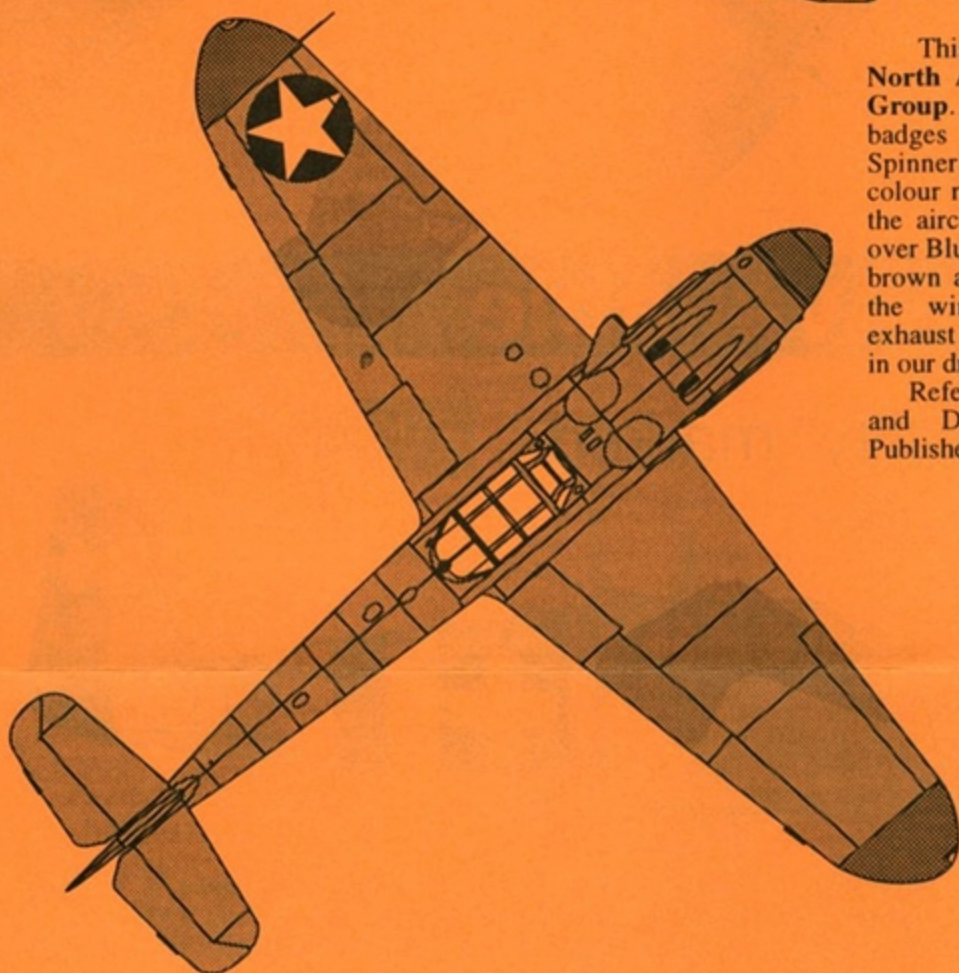
Captured Bf 109G-2 &
Rumanian Bf109E-3

This Bf109G-2 was captured in North Africa by the 79th Fighter Group. They added the flying bug badges and identification markings. Spinner and wing tips are red. A colour reference photograph indicates the aircraft remained in its Sand 79 over Blue 65 paint scheme with darker brown areas added by its captors on the wings and rudder. Extensive exhaust staining was present as shown in our drawings.

General Instructions

Ventura Decals are printed thinly for a painted on look. Dip each design into water for a few seconds, then leave to stand on a non absorbent surface. At first the decal will curl up, then uncurl. This indicates the design has loosened and will slide. Apply carefully to a gloss painted surface and position with a minimum of moving about. The common "silvering" problem with decals is usually caused by excessive moving washing away the decals glue.

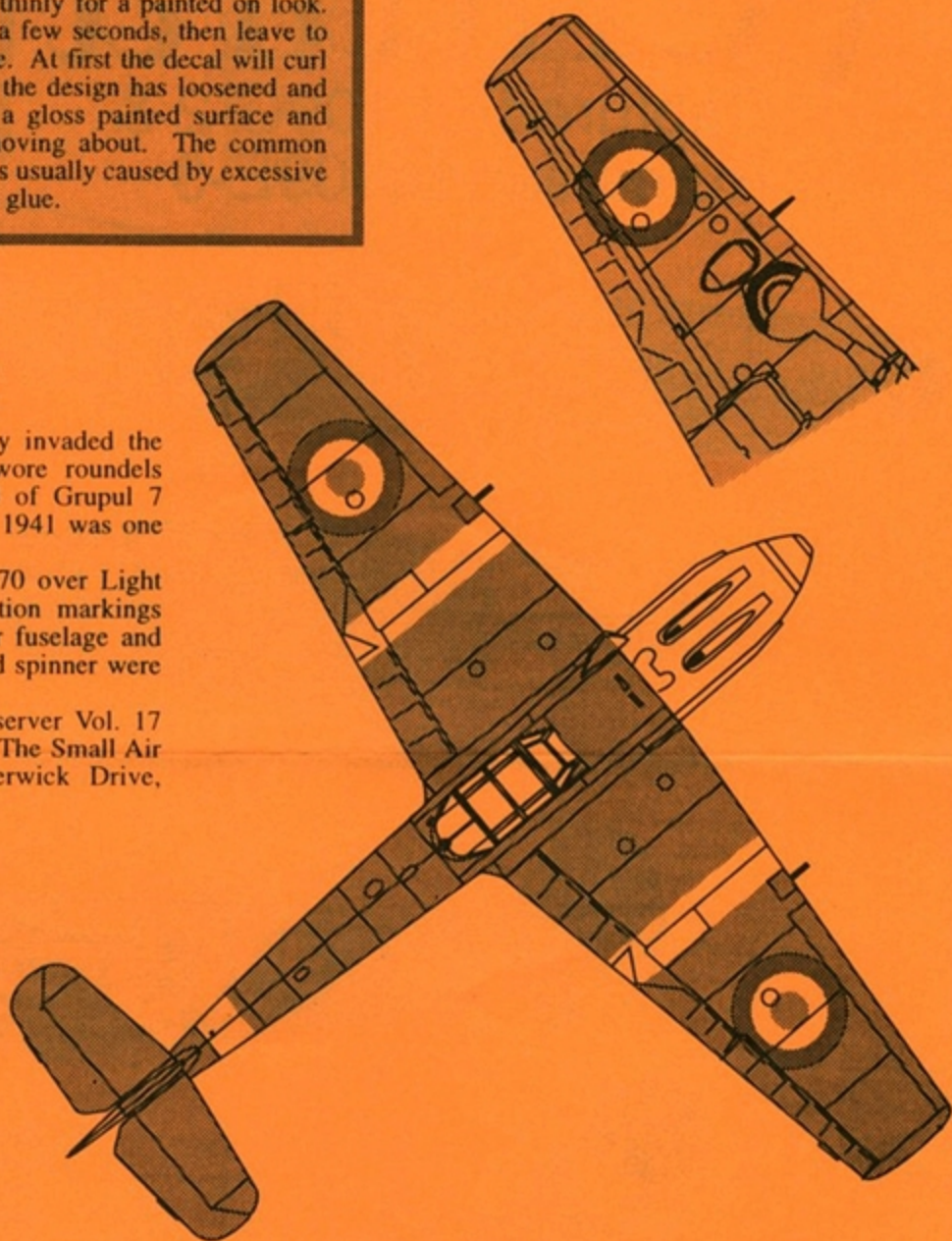
Rumanian Bf109E

Early in WW II, before Germany invaded the Soviet Union, Rumanian aircraft wore roundels rather than crosses. This Bf109E-3 of Grupul 7 Vinatoare at Pipera airfield in April 1941 was one such machine.

Colour scheme was Dark Green 70 over Light Blue 65. Extensive yellow recognition markings were carried. In addition to the rear fuselage and upper wing bands the entire nose and spinner were also yellow.

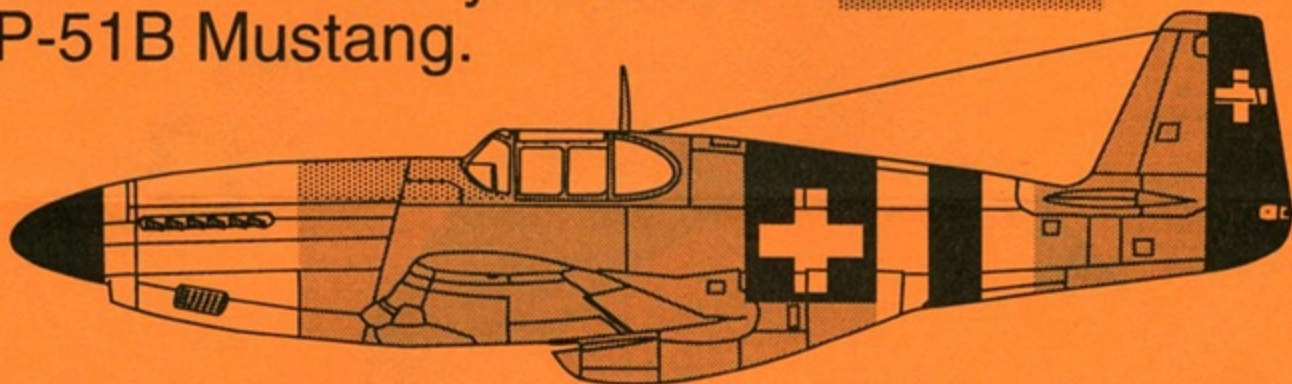

Curtis Simpson at the controls. The aircraft was extensively test flown by the Swiss Air Force and painted in the colourful "Neutrality" scheme depicted in this decal sheet.
