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## "Big Beautiful Doll" special

This decal features only two P-51s flown by John Dave Landers in 8AF, but shows a total of 6 colorful markings that he applied to his AVC during his service with four FGs. John D. Landers hailed from Joshua/Texas (no Wilsor/Oklahoma), and enlisted in April 1941. He got wings a few days after Pearl Harbor, and in January 1942 he went to Darwir/Australia to serve with $9 F S / 49 F G$. He scored 6 inine $38 F S / 55 \mathrm{FG}$ in to States as flight instructor, and Commander of 357 FG for a brief period and retuned

## Marking \#1

Flown by Major John D. Landers, Commander of 38FS 55FG, Wormingford/England, August 5, 1944
Landers joined 38FS as commander in April 1944, and scored 4 kills with P-38 (probably P-38, 43-28341, CG-O "Texas Longhom"), and then transitioned to this P-51 on July 4, 1944. There is a color photo of this ACC (taken on August 5 th) in ref. 1 , and three more b/w photos in ref. $2^{\sim} 5$. These photos indicates that initially back mirror was installed, and irvasion stripes were remaining on lower fuselage and wings (ref. 2), but later photos (ref. 1, 3 5) show back miror and invasion stripes on wings were removed, while lower fuselage invasion stripes seems to be remaining (ref 4). This decal deplcts the last state with 14 kill marks and no back mirror. "Big Beautiful Doll" is applied on both sides of the nose, and the photo in ref. 5 shows the first quotation mark was applied on a white background in a green square Upper tail and antenna seems to be painted in OD, and $s / n$ on tail was painted over, as with many other 55FG P-51s. This AVC is usually claimed as $44-13823$, but ref. 4 shows Mr . Ted Damick's analysis of the original color photo (ref. 1 )

States again as instructor. He came back to 8AF again in February 1945 as Commander of 78 FG till VE day. He then assumed command of 361FG to prepare for combat with Japan, but returned to States atter VJ day. He died on September 12,1989 from complications during surgery. He scored not only 14.5 victories - 6 with P-40 (9FS), 4 with P-38 (38FS) and 4.5 with P-51 (1 with 357FG and 3.5 with 78 FG ) - and one damaged in the air, but also 20 EA destroyed on the ground.

## Markings \#3 and \#4

Flown by Li. Col. John D. Landers, Commander of 78FG, Dudord/England, March and April 1945.
After stateside leave in December to February 1945, he took command of 78 FG from February 22 to June 28, 1945 Initially (Marking \#3) 21 kill marks were applied below canopy, and $5 / n$ was applied over to the rudder (ref. 2, $9^{\sim} 12$ ). The fuselage national insignia was normal type. Close examination of the photo of ref. 11 shows that WZ is outined in yellow, the same color as that of the name pla:e on canopy. Antenna mast was painted in red
At later stage (Marking \#4) s/h was re-applied entirely on the vertical tail (ref. 13), and the fuselage national insignia is gray shaded as with many 78FG P-51s. This photo in rel. 13 clearly shows "Big Beautitul Doll" was also applied on the right side, which should be true with Marking 3. Another photo (once shown on e-bay) clearly shows yellow outline on code letters, and 27.5 kill marks. At this stage there is no red trim on OD anti-glare paint.

## Marking \#5

Flown by Col. John D. Landers, Commander of 78FG, Dudord/England, May to June 1945
When Landers was promoted to Colonel in May 1945, he chanced the color of the name plate on canopy frame and outine of fuselage code to red. Fuselage national insignia
w/block treaded main wheels
that its $s / n$ is 44-13923.
He took this A/C to 357FG along with his S/Sgt. Bergman in October 1944 (ref. 2, 4).

## Marking \#2

Flown by Lt. Col. John D. Landers, Acting Commander of 357 FG, Leistor/England, November to December 1944. Landers was promoted to Lt . Col., and assumed Acting Commander position of 357 FG for a short period (Oct. 11 1944 ~ December 2, 1944), while Col. Irwin Dregne was on stateside leave. Reference 4 shows one photo of this AC taken soon after moving to 357FG (note the number of kill mark is the same as Marking \#1). OD paint on the tall was removed, but no $s / n$ is visible. Very probably $s / n$ was applied later. Another photo in ref. 2, 6 and 7 shows 17 kil marks. Probably this is the later stage of this marking. "Blg Beautiful Doll' on right should have been retained. According to ref. 8, this ACC was lost in a mid-air collision with another P-51, killing its pilot Lt. Wendell Helwig, on December 24, 1944 during an escort mission to BabenhauserV
Germany. The name of the A/C was stl . Germany. The name of the AVC was st|l "Big Beautiful Doll". was returned to the normal type. Further decoration applied spinner, air intake and OD anti-glare panel, (2) addition of $\mathrm{b} / \mathrm{w}$ checker on wingtip with red trim, (3) black paint on the tip of vertical and horizontal fin with red trim to these as well as to black rudder, and (4) application of code letter on lower left wing after VE day. (Ret. 3, 6, 7, 10, 13 ${ }^{\sim} 18$ )

## Marking " 8

Flown by Col. John D. Landers, Commander of 361FG, Little WalderVEngland, July 1945.
Col. Landers was assigned to Commander of 361FG on June 29, 1945, whie Lt. Col. Roy Caviness was assigned to Commander of 78 FG from 361 FG .
The only photo of this marking is shown in ret. 4, and its marking is established by Mr. Craig Quattlebaum and Mr. Jack Johnson (contributor of the photo) as yellow nose (of $361 F G$ ) and medium blue canopy, rudder and wingtip. There is some possibility that tip of vertical stabilizer (black in Marking \#5) was aso changed to blue. Apparently "Big Beautitul Doll, name plate on canopy and 36.5 kill marks remain intact, so the $s / n$ should be as in Marking \#\#. It seems no outine on fuselage code. As win other 361FG post in letters on war period, here should be a relatively large code letters on lower left wing
