
Color Notes:

Cockpit interior were RLM 66 with wheel wells, struts etc, RLM 02. Spinner were Black or RLM 70 with spiral as depicted. Propeller blades were RLM 70.




FW 190 A/8 W. Nr 732183 Flown by Staffelkapităn of 12/JG5 Leutnant Rudi Linz, early 1945, Herdla/Norway. Unit was expelled out of Finland after the armistice with Russia, and moved to Herdla. Camouflage in Sld 74/75/76 with blue/white number, dot and spinner/spiral. According to photo on page 368 of Le FW 190 (Docavia/edition Laviere, Lorant and Frappe, 1981) and also photo on page 188 of "Die Deutschen" Jagdgeswader in Russia, Landfelzug, only 1 A/C in 12/JG5 seem to have a blue spinner, and based on the kill marks it is assumed it is Kapt Linz's A/C.



FW 190, possibly an A-9, one of the few made that reached operational status. RLM 75/83/76 with 04 band around and lower cowling and rudder. Plain black crosses on fuselage and bottom wings. A/C found in Munich, at the end of the war.



FW 190 A8/R8 of JG3. A/C appears to be camouflaged in RLM 74/ 75/76, although the whole fuselage is in RLM 74, with a light patch of RLM 76 behind the cross. Upper deck guns were remove to compensate for the extra weight of steel armor plating on the fuselage and the armored glass panels.



FW 190 F-8,W Nr Unknown, belonging to II/SG4, during the summer of 1944 somewhere in Russia. This A/C was camouflaged in RLM 75/76/83 with yellow theatre markings on rudder, lower wing tips, fuselage bands and spinner. A white/black spiral decorated the spinner. Of note is the letter E on the cowling and insde the command chevron. Paint spinner yellow; when dry apply black spiral decal 108 and when dry apply 10A.
