






Supermarine Spitfire Mk.I RN-N (serial over-painted). Flight Officer Desmond Sheen 72 Squadron, Acklington, June 1940. Flight Officer Des Sheen was one of the early Spitfire aces. His Mk.I Spitfire is painted in the 'B' pattern of the Temperate Land Scheme. Note his personal emblem below the cockpit.






Supermarine Spitfire Mk.I P9386 QV-K. Squadron Leader Brian Lane. 19 Squadron, Fowlmere, September 1940. Note the introduction of the white individual aircraft letter to the code set and unusual yellow spinner. Both these were used as a means of identifying the Squadron Leader to his fellow pilots during combat.

Supermarine Spitfire Mk.lb X4272 QJ-D. 92 Squadron, Biggin Hill, December 1940. X4272 is depicted at the time of the introduction of the Sky Blue fuselage band and also the Night painted under surface of the port wing. This was intended to aid the tracking of 'friendly' aircraft by spotters and anti-aircraft gunners.





Spitfire Mk.I, R6690 PR-Q, 609 Sqdn, RAF Middle Wallop, September 1940. Flown by Pilot Officer M. Appleby. Dark Earth, Dark Green & Sky camouflage (Type A pattern) with Black spinner. Fin flashes in 7" stripe widths.
