



P-51C *INA The MACON BELLE* flown by Lt. Lee 'Buddy' Archer, 302nd FS, 332nd FG. This aircraft was overall duraluminum with olive drab anti-glare panel. The fin, rudder, tail & spinner were painted Insignia Red. The nose art is thought to have been carried on both sides of the aircraft. Insignia Yellow theater stripes were applied to the wings, and the wing tips were painted Insignia Red. The trim tabs were Insignia Yellow. Paint the air intake lip below the spinner Insignia Yellow prior to application of decals 23L & 23R.

*NOTE: P-51's were delivered in a standard finish consisting of natural metal on the fuselage, vertical fin, and horizontal stabilizers. The majority of the upper and lower wings were painted aluminum lacquer with all rivets and joints sealed to provide smoother airflow over the laminar flow wing. Ailerons and flaps were left in natural metal. P-51D "Little Freddie", S/N unknown, flown by Lt.. Freddie Hutchins, 302nd FS, 332nd FG. This aircraft was overall duraluminum with olive drab anti-glare panel. The fin, rudder, tail & spinner were Insignia Red. The theater stripes on the wings and the trim tabs were Insignia Yellow, while the wing tips were Insignia Red. The nose art is believed to be carried on both sides of the aircraft. When applying the nose art, offset decal 18b to the upper right of 18a (see scrap view, right).

Little is known about the Tuskegee Airmen. However, like any other fighter squadron, they all had nick names, such as "Mr. Death", "Buster", "Fantastic" and "Black Jackson." Their A/C, besides having splendid red tails were splashed with legends like "Harlem Speaks", "125th and Lennox", "A Train", and "High Yellow." Unfortunately for history's sake, not many pictures of these planes and pilots have survived the years.

Claiming never to have lost a bomber under their care, the members of the 99th, 100th, 301st and 302dn FS, had one thing in common: They were the only black pilots flying escort duties for the USAAC.

They called themselves the "Spookwaffe" which confused the German intelligence at first. The Germans knew that "waffe" must have been a spinoff of their own Luftwaffe, but they were not quite conversant in the slang of the American blacks to know what "Spook" meant. Sadly, they also called themselves "The Lonely Eagles", due to the isolationism and bigotry of the Air Corps in those early days.

They flew escort missions to Germany, Austria and Czechoslovakia, and also participated in many of the Ploesti oil Refinery Raids. Besides not losing a single bomber escorted by their group, they also claimed to be the only outfit to fly 4 different types of A/C in their area of operations, and the only group to sink a destroyer with fighters in Europe. Although this decal set merely highlights the aircraft used in their involment in history, we felt obligated to give you modelers, a short insight in to these unsung heroes of World War II.
