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

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Applying the Decals

You probably already know all this stuff, so feel free to use your regular process...however, if you' re new to aftermarket decals, here goes:

- Generally, use the Microscale Finishing System. We don't recommend extremely strong decal solvents such as Solvaset.
- Your model must have a smooth, glossy surface, as decals won't adhere well to matte surfaces. Use gloss paints or your favorite clear gloss overspray over matte or semigloss paint.
- Cut each subject out without trimming off the slight excess film (this helps the decal film disappear when dry).
- Put the decal in warm water that has a drop or two of liquid dishwashing soap or photo-flo for 10 seconds.
- When the decal will slide off the backing paper without forcing it, apply it to the proper position on your model. Slide the backing paper out from underneath
- Gently blot off excess water and smooth out bubbles under the decal surface. If you wish, carefully brush on a mild decal softener such as Micro-Sol.
- When all decals are completely dry, gently wash off all excess decal adhesive.
- Finally, overcoat your model with a good quality gloss coat, followed by your choice of matte or eggshell clear topcoat.

The Revell 1/32 RF-4 fin cap is badly misshapen; the good news is that they made it too tall and it's easily correctable. Use your razor saw to remove a horizontal slice from the MIDDLE of the kit fin cap. Be sure to keep the top section with the flared edge leading to the small, round, rear formation light. Discard the center section, glue the top piece to the bottom, then file and sand to the final outline shown above. That's all there is to it!

Color & Markings Notes

- To make room on the decal sheet, in some cases the complete aircraft number must be assembled from other numbers provided on the decal
- For the RF-4Cs, use the photoflash ejector warning triangles from the Revell 1/32 RF-4 kit or from Cutting Edge Modelworks decal CED32004
- Some aircraft had a red warning stripe across the opening portion of the Ram Air Turbine doors on the left side of the fuselage (use red decal

Building/Painting Techniques

 Painting the non-skid walkways: there were at least a couple of variations in the shape of the engine intake cover walkways; the templates here are correct for the MANG and Edwards birds. Note that the walkways were actually a non-skid material applied over the base color, which essentially just darkened the base color somewhat, so FS 595 color matches are not applicable. Both the MANG and Edwards aircraft engine intake top walkways had a thin black cheatline stripe on the outboard edges, but NOT along the fuselage spine edge. The walkway on top of the spine had a black outline all the way around.

Make the walkways by painting the general area the walkway color, then overspray with dullcote or other flattener. When thoroughly dry, mask with Frisket paper or other material, then spray the fuselage color over the mask. When thoroughly dry, remove the mask and your walkway will be perfect! Outline the edges with black Pactra Striping Tape or decal stripes, and you're done

 Edwards wing & tail markings: the wing star-and-bar & "USAF" and tail serial number on the Edwards AFB aircraft have a thin white nd. Paint the model white then cut masks as shown above from Frisket Paper or other masking material. After the white paint is THOROUGHLY dry, carefully position the masks over the white paint. Mask the wings and tail for the orange paint. When you remove all the masks, you'll have a white box for the tail number and white cutouts for the star & USAF markings!

Michigan ANG (MANG) Schemes

• The Air National Guard (ANG) traditionally keeps their "babies" clean. The MANG kept their F-4s in immaculate condition—those that went to William Tell were in perfect condition (or at least as perfect as possible for a F-41)

From the time the F-4s were received until just before the William Tell '84 gunnery meet in October 1984, the following notes apply

- An external rearview mirror must be added to the WSO's movable canopy for the MANG birds. It's simple to make from scrap sheet plastic.
- PilotWSO names were NOT frequently seen on their respective left cariopy rails, instead, the small aircraft serial number stencil was usually seen in that spot. None of the aircraft depicted on this sheet carried pilotWSO names
- w chief name was carried on the lower left engine intake or the left air conditioning intake
- The Michigan Air National Guard (MANG) used large, black, two digit plane-in-squadron rear fuselage numbers; some of these aircraft had the red turbine warning stripe around the fuselage. Tail numbers were in the tactical style (AF/63 XXX), and the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award

William Tell '84 Scheme (October 1984):

- No aircrew names on the competition aircraft (aircraft serial numbers stencilled on front left pilot & WSO movable canopy frames)
- · Crew chief name on left air conditioning intake
- · RHAW antennas overpainted in ADC Gray
- ANG badge replaced AFOUA ribbon; large "interceptor-type" five digit serial; apple logo on nose gear door
- Four of the five MANG aircraft that went to WT '84 had new nose art applied for the meet (Never Trust A Smiling Cat was already on 583). Eldred (El) Mason, owner of Bare-Metal Foil—known to modelers everywhere—painted the Garfield artwork directly on the fuselage of 583. The others were painted on self-adhesive clear material which was sealed down with lacquer on the actual aircraft—it sounds like a HUGE decal! The artwork was only applied the day before the unit's departure for the William Tell competition

General Notes

- The AIM-9 Sidewinders supplied with the Tamiya 1/32 F-4C/D are a mishmash of types and do not properly represent any specific Sidewinder type—and in any case have the large wings (tail fins) used ONLY post-Vietnam war by the USAFI. The AIM-7s are pretty good as-is.
- . The early Light Gull Gray & White aircraft do NOT have the arrowhead-shaped stiffener on the stabilator, so sand it off if necessary. All the other
- aircraft DO have the stiffener as represented in the kit.
