SPITFIRE VC 'Tropical'

Probably the best known of all WWII aircrfat, the Spitfire began its production life as the MKI. With the Hurricane it dominated the Battle of Britain, both aircraft outclassing their Luftwaffe counterparts.

However, as German technology improved its own aircraft, there was an urgent need to improve the Spitfire to cope with the new enemy aircraft.

From the MkI evolved the MkV, with further improvements to airframe and engine producing the VC (via a MkIII prototype never actually put into production)

Quantity production began in October 1941 using the Merlin 45 in place of the original Merlin III engine and the 'C' type 'Universal' wing. This wing permitted the use of a variety of armament configurations between cannon and machine guns.

The VC 'Tropical' was introduced because of the need to counter the strength of the Luftwaffe in several overseas theatres, not the least of these being the defense of Malta. A large air filter (Vokes Aero-Vee) was fitted giving the aircraft and ungainly appearance, together with an enlarged radiator and oil cooler intakes underneath the wings. None of these additions appreciably influenced the performation of the aircraft.

Our model ES187 from 154 SQN uses the standard 'C' wing but there were many VC 'D' or 'clipped' wing aircraft introduced, giving the aircraft a slightly poorer performance but an improved rate of roll for combat manoeuvres. The standard desert camooflage scheme was used (see next paragraph).

The VC 'Tropical' was used in many war theatres. Our model also depicts the USAF aircraft' from the 308 Figher Sqn. of the 31 st. Fighter Group US 12 th. AF in Tunisia. This aircraft sported the standard British Desert Camouglafe scheme (Dark Earth and Middle Stone upper surfaces with Azure Blue undersurfaces) but with American insignia.

The RAAF also used many VCs, an interesting colour scheme being the overall natural metall finish with a completely white tailm area and white leading wing edges.

The spitfire MkV, with all its variants, eventually equipped more than 100 RAF units, was sold to nine overseas airforces and became the most commonly used fighter aircraft in WWII since it operated in every theatre where the RAF or the Allies were to be found.

Of course, the Spitfire itself was further improved throughout the war period and in its final variants continued in service long after hostilities had ceased. An actual VC (though not - tropical - ised) can be seen at the Shuttleworth Trust in Bedford - this aircraft being a 'C' with a 'D' wing.




