

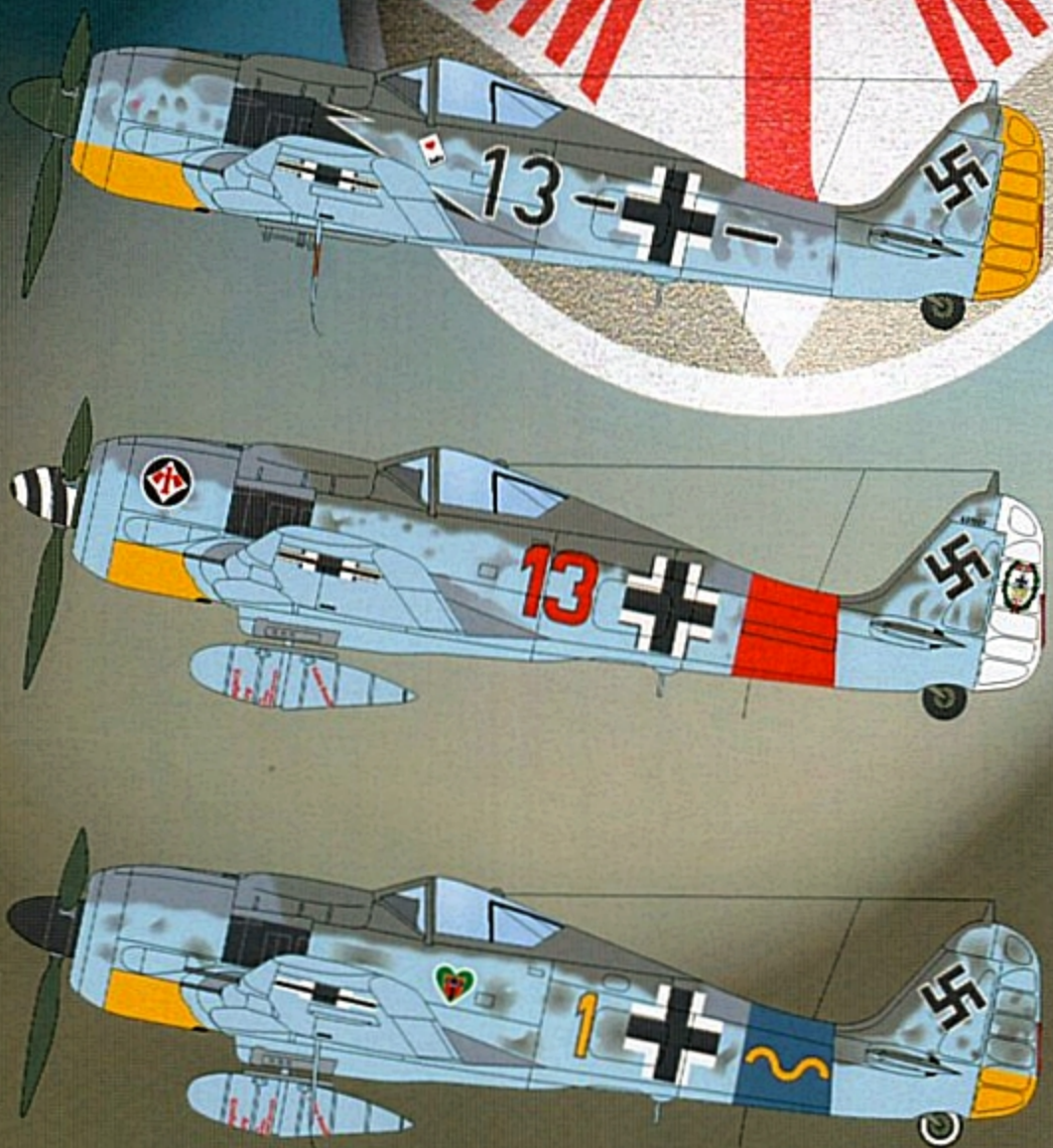

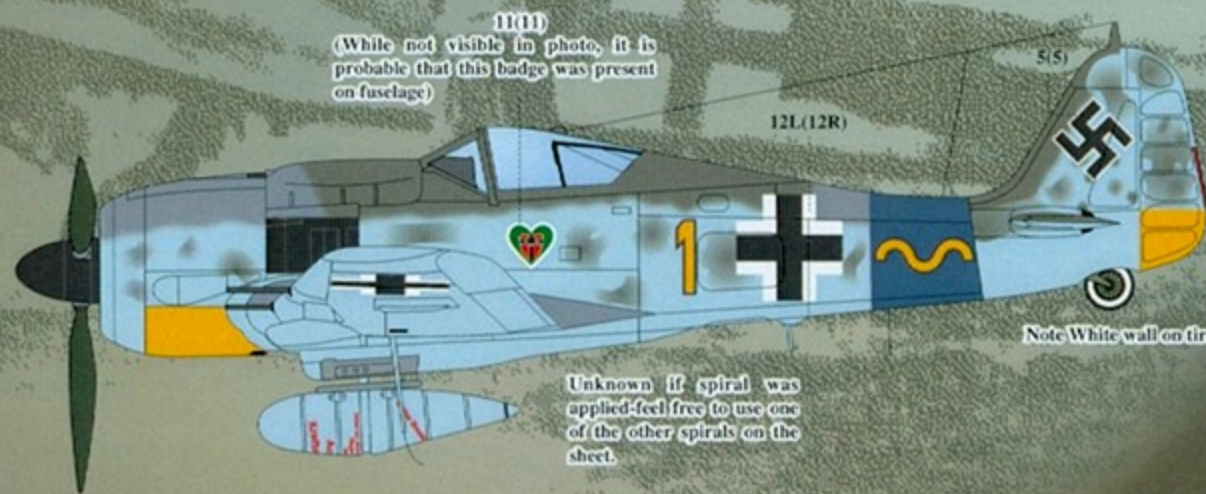


Suggested Kit: DML/ Tamiya Fw-190 Family.

FW 190 A-8, flown by Oberst. Josef Priller, of Stab / JG26, France, June 6, 1944. Standard Luftwaffe camouflage of RLM 74/75/76 with Yellow lower cowling and rudder. Black exhaust area and RLM 70 or Black spinner. We do not know with certainty if this is the a/c in which Priller flew over the beaches of Normandy, on June 6, the only German a/c to do so that day, (of course, with his wingman). A very clever and clear headed pilot while in combat, Priller achieved over 100 victories. Very well known Luftwaffe personality.



FW 190 A-7, - Stab 11/ JG1, Germany, April/May, 1944. Flown by one of the Luftwaffe's truly great pilots, Major Heinz Bär. Camouflaged in standard RLM colors 74/75/76, with Yellow lower cowling. White rudder, Black spinner with White spiral and JG1's Red fuselage band. Cloudy circumstances caused Bär to be relieved of his command, and ended the war as a pilot in Galland's famous JV44, Squadron of aces (or outcasts). We are supplying you parts 13 or 14 as an option. Paint Red band before decaling.



FW 190 A-8, of 15. /JG54, flown by Hptm Rudolf Klemm. In typical Luftwaffe camouflage of RLM 74/75/76, this a/c had Yellow lower cowling, lower rudder tip and a Black spinner with a Blue fuselage band. All our references are in a German book, so with our limited knowledge of the language, we are afraid this is all the information we can give you about this colorful A/C.

(While not visible in photo, it is probable that this badge was present on fuselage)

Unknown if spiral was applied- feel free to use one of the other spirals on the sheet.
